Unsurprisingly 2011 has kicked off where in fashion not to dissimilar to last year and the year before that! The end of 2010 saw the farewell and the celebration of the long and distinguished careers of five senior RAEME corps members who had long-standing ties to to Army Aviation: BRIG Charles "Jock" Crocombe, COL Anthony "Hector" McWatters, COL Jim Phasey, MAJ Mark "Moose" Wharton and MAJ Neville Clarke. All were farewelled at the Corps Birthday dinner at Oakey where they arrived at the assembled mess via Black Hawk helicopter.

Army Aviation, like many other components of Army remained heavily committed to supporting operations overseas and here in Australia over the Christmas period and well into February. In addition to our ongoing overseas commitments our Craftsmen and women were deployed throughout the Eastern seaboard supporting natural disaster relief efforts. They all performed to a sterling level, demonstrating the adaptability, resolve, commitment and compassion that is a characteristic of the RAEME craftsman and the Australian Soldier. Well done!

Those that support Aviation continue to look to the future with a number of key activities proceeding which will set the foundations for the future. The establishment of the Directorate of Aviation within HQ FORCOMD sees the recently promoted Colonel Steve Evans appointed as the COL AVN SPT, where he and his team are responsible for the further development and implementation of the maintenance reform activities via PLAN PELICAN. This work is also complemented by the Aviation Force Modernisation Review that is being headed by COL Tong Borg along with cross ADF Aviation issues being examined the Joint Aviation Workforce Integrated Project Team (JAW IPT).

The employment category review for the RAEME air trades is about to commence with these trades scheduled for presentation to the Army Personnel Committee in early 2013. This is an important opportunity to ensure that the trade structures are developed and enabled to meet the future challenges of supporting the Army Aviation Capability.

DEPUTY HEAD OF CORPS - RAEME (GND) LIEUTENANT COLONEL TODD ASHURST

2011 has commenced with the normal rush that all Spanners are no doubt accustomed to. The individual and collective training environments are extremely busy with the raise, training, and sustaining of Army while force elements preparing for operations ramp up. RAEME remains the second largest Corps in Army and the challenges for our future with projects such as L121, L17, L200 requires that our equipment requirements and future maintenance liability is clearly understood.

For those with operational experience it is vital that we capture RAEME "lessons learnt" and RAEME requirements through Operational User Requirements, CA Suggestion Scheme or Centre for Army Lessons (CALS). A recent check with CALS revealed that there are no RAEME specific lessons learnt from operational areas recorded. I implore all RAEME officers and tradesmen to use the keyboard to capture operational lessons and shortfalls in order to influence future deployments, TTPs, Doctrine, and equipment procurement. CALS have advised that lessons can be submitted at any stage, including *after* your return from deployment. For further information on lessons learned collection please speak to the SO2 Corps.

The HOC Cell has been re-engaged with the Combat Service Support Force Modernisation Review (CSS FMR) and is providing its input into Plan Beersheba. This provides an opportunity to shape the future of the Corps into the next stages of the Adaptive Army. Our future must reinvigorate the grades of repair, repair limits, tooling and Class 9 (RPS) management, repair pools and the conduct of repairs as far forward as possible (in barracks and in the field). We will keep you updated of our progress in future newsletters, if you have a perspective you would like to share please let the HOC Cell know what it is.

The DHOC and Corps RSM visits have commenced for 2011 and we have recently been able to visit Corps members in Sydney, Adelaide, and Townsville. It was great to see all the units and your questions and feedback received was excellent. I hope that the members of the RAEME feel informed and know that the Corps is fighting for them. I would also like to thank 102 Fd Wksp for hosting the Spanner Club, it was a great means to catch up with the Spanner community in Townsville.

Not surprisingly a key issue raised in our visits is vacancies in Workshops, but this is being addressed now. There is currently the largest quantity of RAEME ground based trades in training at the Army School of Electrical and Mechanical Engineering (ASEME) since the Army Apprentice School days. Other RAEME ground trades in training with ASEME on initial employment training (ITT) or on-thejob experience (OJE) are:

This is outstanding news for the Corps and demonstrates that the training pipeline will finally provide CFN ranked tradesman to meet Army's ground trade requirements. This has not been an easy feat. The number of trainees at ASEME has doubled since Jan 2009 with no increase in staff. This has required some significant change management affecting school structure, our training (trade and military), and administration to maximise our throughput without reducing standards or quality. The ASEME staff have achieved this and more, and as DHOC and CO ASEME I am immensely proud of their efforts.

The above training figures demonstrate that ASEME's training will resolve the CFN shortfall, but the vacancies from LCPL to SGT (see attached table) can only be resolved by training and retaining our people. This challenge is now passed to all JNCO, SNCO and WO of the Corps. You must keep your tradesmen motivated, engaged, challenged to assist in their retention. Do not wait for someone else to do this for you or it will be too late.

I would like to farewell MAJ Babington as SO2 Corps and thank him for his dedication and work for RAEME. He has not gone far and is now the 2IC ASEME, a position that continues to bring his considerable experience and knowledge to the fore. Welcome to MAJ Al Rankin as the SO2 Corps. He has extensive experience in REME and RAEME and he is a welcome addition to the HOC team.

I highlight that if there are issues in the Corps that are of concern then do not assume that we know about them. Contact the Head of Corps (SO2 Corps) to provide the issues or feedback. I look forward to seeing you all during my visits this year.

The ASEME website includes an Excel spreadsheet that lists all course sessions being conducted by ASEME. This information is updated on a monthly basis and is useful when identifying potential session dates that fit with both unit and personal requirements.

Mercedes Benz G Wagon Training

Introduction into Service maintenance training for the G Wagon for Army Vehicle Mechanic, Technician Electrical and Recovery Mechanic trades is due to begin in May 11.

Panels for these sessions will be assigned in accordance with Army's Basis of Issue (BOI) of the equipment to Brigades/units. The current BOI will see G Wagons introduced initially into 7 BDE, 1 BDE, 9 FSB, 1 DIV units and Air Force. Later deliveries will include 4 BDE, 5 BDE, 9 BDE, 13 BDE and the RFSU's.

Vehicle Mechanics there are 74, 10 day sessions scheduled over the next 2½ years. Each Vehicle Mechanic session will cover the technology gap between the current in service Land Rover and G Wagon Family of Vehicles (FOV), and will include engine management, EURO V emission systems, automatic transmission management, CAN Bus Electrical system, ABS brakes and vehicle fault diagnosis using the Mercedes Benz STAR Diagnostic Tool. The course will be delivered by the LAND 121 Training Team Maintenance Training Section Latchford Barracks Bonegilla. The LAND 121 TRG TM is a combined team Army, Air Force and contracted personnel. The prerequisites for the course are as follows:

Army - ECN 229 (fully trade proficient IAW Employment Specifications)

Civilian - Certificate III in Automotive Mechanical (Heavy Vehicle Road Transport) (E) and

All - Certificate II in Automotive Air Conditioning

Technician Electrical there are 21, 4 day sessions scheduled over the next 2 ¹/₂ years. Each Tech Elec session will cover the electrical system technology gap between the current in service Land Rover and the G Wagon, and will include the CAN Bus Electrical system, an overview of the electrical systems of:

engine management system;

automatic transmission electronic control;

ABS brakes (electrical only);

Starting and charging systems; and

vehicle fault diagnosis using the Mercedes Benz STAR Diagnostic Tool.

The Tech Elec course will be delivered by the LAND 121 Training Team Maintenance Training Section at Latchford Barracks Bonegilla. The prerequisites for the course are as follows:

Army ECN 418 (fully trade proficient IAW Employment Specifications)

Civilian - Certificate III in Automotive Electrical (E).

Recovery Mechanics there are 24, 2-3 day sessions scheduled over the next $2\frac{1}{2}$ years. Each Recovery Mech session will cover the skills and knowledge to perform recovery operations on the G Wagon, and will be delivered by the LAND 121 Training Team Maintenance Training Section in Brigade or Area locations. Each recovery Mech session will cover the preparation for towing requirements and minor fault finding. The prerequisites for the course are as follows:

G Wagon Operator course; and

Army - ECN 226 (fully trade proficient IAW Employment Specifications).

The allocation of personnel to sessions will be conducted IAW the BOI into units. The LAND 121 Training Team has allocated a priority to ensure that the correct people are trained at the correct time. The priority system is as follows:

PRIORITY 1: Per IAW AHQ Basis of Issue (BOI) batches and maintenance training establishments;

PRIORITY 2: CFN, CPL and civilian personnel in direct maintenance support roles;

PRIORITY 3: Supervisors of Pers in direct maintenance support roles (SGT - WO1); and

PRIORITY 4: Maintenance units in support roles of the Basis of Issue (BOI).

All nominations for sessions is to be through PMKeyS PD&T. Calls for nominations will be issued through signals to receiving units in advance of the delivery of the vehicles. Unit positions on the sessions have been allocated to ensure maximum trade group coverage. Under subscription or non allocation of pers to sessions after the call for nominations will see that unit entitlement lost or reallocated.

It is highly recommended that all Vehicle Mechanics and Tech Elec personnel, that are required to attend G Wagon maintenance training IAW the BOI, attend the G Wagon Operator Course prior to the maintenance courses. IOT attend the G Wagon Operator course, personnel must hold the minimum **P105165 ADF Licence Code C2**.


Corps Funds
